In the Library: Quaker Quicks and Staff Picks

When God Became White by Grace Ji-Sun Kim

To the “white” reader, Kim’s account of her experiences as a Christian Korean child immigrant to the U.S. are distressing, to say the least. She describes the picture of the “white” Jesus treasured by her mother and family that symbolized the faith that rejected her identity, and also symbolized her “othering” at school and, later in the workplace. Kim then goes back historically to recount the Europeanization of Christianity and the transformation of Jesus from a dark-skinned Palestinian Jew to a light-skinned Caucasian that became the rationalization and tool of colonization and subjugation of Native and South Americans, Asians, and people of color around the world. And also, as depiction of God as a white male, to further the domination over females. Racism went hand-in-hand with that.

Enabled by Christian missionaries together with the degradation of native cultures, the results were white supremacy, white privilege, sexism, and patriarchy.

Kim advocates moving to a non-white, non-gendered concept of God as Spirit—with attributes of Breath, Wind, Light, and Vibration—that would make God available to all peoples, regardless of race, sex, or ethnicity.

○ **For July we are collecting shampoo and detergent.**

Here's what we'll focus on each month:

- June 15 —toothpaste & toothbrushes: *We delivered 111 lbs of toothbrushes, toothpaste, & floss. The Meeting has decided to commit to a regular purchase of these items in bulk.*
- July 20 — shampoo & detergent
- August 17 — diapers (esp. large sizes 4, 5, 6, 7)
- September 21 — toothpaste & toothbrushes
- October 19 — shampoo & detergent
- November 16 — diapers (esp. large sizes)
- December 21 — toilet paper: *Let's outdo ourselves, and build a "toilet paper Xmas tree" like the one we did in 2011 that contained over 750 rolls!*

And we'll continue on into the New Year.

And...EVERY MONTH: The most basic staples, including potatoes and dried beans (pintos), are increasingly scarce. So bring them too, and put them in the box in the fellowship room.

Reports

Willamette Quarterly Meeting Planning Committee Report

In addition to the previous month's report re WQM

1. There was unity among Friends in attendance to recommend separate M4B from the annual retreat. Friends suggested returning it to Corvallis in February as in previous years. This needs consultation with Worship Groups not represented at WQM. The question was raised: whose responsibility is this?
2. Eugene Friends Meeting agreed at MfB in June to host the 2026 WQM at Lutherwood.
3. CFM needs to reach unity on the prompting to hold the WQM Meeting for Business in Corvallis (or hybrid) annually in February, likely a one-day Saturday or Sunday gathering with some social opportunity and/or educational elements related to Quaker practices or roles. *** Friends approved supporting and taking on responsibility of a Winter Quarterly Meeting held in Corvallis. CFM does not expect to take on responsibility for program content.**

Treasurer's Report

Worship and Ministry Report

1. Seven Friends, plus fifteen others attended the Corvallis Interfaith Network (CIN) meeting June first at CFM Meeting House to answer a series of queries about the golden rule. Activities of the CIN will resume in the fall.

Pastoral Care Committee (PCC)

Pastoral Care Committee is happy to agree with the Membership Committee for Laura Horsey. We find that she is well prepared: seasoned in the sauce of many Meetings for Worship, and has done diverse work in our DIY religious body, including serving on Nominating Committee, as the Volunteer Coordinator of the Grounds committee during which she oversaw the creation of our front perennial garden, and currently as the clerk of the Pastoral Care Committee.

She has searched for a spiritual home among several religious traditions, including Mormonism, mainline protestant faiths, and Sufiism. She has acquainted herself with the principal tenets of Quaker Faith and Practice and the expectations of membership. She is satisfied that it is time to request membership. We are delighted to ask the Meeting for Business to approve the membership request of Laura Horsey.

***Meeting approved membership for Laura Horsey. A welcome celebration is scheduled for the July pot luck (at Laura's house).**

Nominating Committee Report (NomCom)

Changes to the NomCom report submitted at May Meeting for Business:

Removed Ruth Johanna's name from Groundskeeping.

Added Kathy Miller and Abigail Stoughton as Joint Coordinators of Groundskeeping.

Added Marybetts Sinclair as Greeter

*** Meeting approved the final NomCom report.**

*** Meeting approved of Greeters to commence before July.**

A question was raised as to whether the volunteer "groups" are/should be considered committees. The sense of the Meeting was that the volunteers themselves could choose to become committees. Though they operate semi-independently, the Meeting expects to hear back from them.

Peace, Justice and Environment (PJ&E)

1. The question was raised as to whether CFM wishes to supply toothbrushes, toothpaste, and dental floss for the South Corvallis Food Bank (SCFB) for at least a year. The cost would be approximately \$340/3 times a year. This is a project CFM used to fund, but it lapsed over the covid years. The SCFB is seeing a drastic cut in funding from federal sources.

*** Meeting approved funding this for the rest of year (approximately \$400).** Treasurer requested an estimate of costs for the 2026 budget.

2. A question was raised about signs being placed around the Worship Room informing Friends of PJ&E activities (primarily SCFB donations for each month).

The following points were raised by Friends:

- No one gathers in the library or the fellowship room. Before covid, people gathered there to visit and to share refreshments;
- The bulletin board is full of notices, many of which are not CFM activities;
- The signs convey important and pressing information regarding urgent action needing to be taken;
- The Meeting Room should be restful with a reflective atmosphere. Though the signs convey important information, they are a distraction;
- Needs require a critical mass to get Meeting buy-in. The serenity of the MR is important, but needs should be lifted up. Evidence of action turns an issue from generic to very specific and galvanizes us to action.

- Perhaps the signboard should be resurrected from the closet, to post information during announcements at the rise of Meeting;
- Signs could be posted on the bathroom door. People can see them as they enter the Meeting House. This idea was met with general acceptance;
- Other groups using our Meeting House will see the signs, become aware of issues and may spark discussion and imagination;
- I come for spiritual reflection. If it get too heavily political, you lose the spiritual side.

3. The discussion prompted the question of how we can support worship in the Meeting Room, an issue that Worship and Ministry should take up. Disuse of the fellowship room prompted a comment that we should encourage active fellowship in the fellowship area.

Announcements

1. NPYM falls on July 13, the regular M4B. Therefore, *** the Meeting approved skipping M4B in July. The next M4B scheduled for August 10.**
2. In answer to a question about Meeting House availability, Jeff Kline stated that he holds the MH available for Friends on Wednesday evenings and Sundays until 2:00 or 2:30. He also noted that he gives viewing privileges on google docs of the current schedule. He posts the schedule at the front door of the Meeting House, but it will not be as current as the online version.
