She starts with the views expressed in *The Parables of Jesus*, a publication of the Jesus Seminar which sought to identify the actual words of Jesus in the Gospels and came up with little more than portions of the various parables. Starting with these fragments and the interpretations of early Quakers, she adds experiences of her own to produce a series of reflections about a God that requires of us only unconditional love.

Report: The Full Belly, Dry Head Art Sale fundraiser for the South Corvallis Food Bank on Sept 20 raised \$2,230!

Every month on Third Sunday:

At the May Meeting for Business, Friends embraced the commitment of CFM to help: At each Third Sunday potluck we'll focus on one type of item to collect. Please bring as much as you can each month —and if you can't come to potluck, bring your donations to the meetinghouse ahead of time and put them in the box in the fellowship room.

○ For October we are focusing on shampoo and detergent.

Here's what we'll focus on each month:

- October 19 — shampoo & detergent
- November 16 — diapers (esp. large sizes)
- December 21 — toilet paper: *Let's outdo ourselves, and build a "toilet paper Xmas tree" like the one we did in 2011 that contained over 750 rolls!*

And we'll continue on into the New Year.

And...EVERY MONTH: The most basic staples, including potatoes and dried beans (pintos), are increasingly scarce. So bring them too, and put them in the box in the fellowship room.

It might appear that, because the Quaker meeting must wait for unity, this method would trend toward conservatism. This is sometimes the case, but in general, Quaker pioneering in social reforms shows that conservatism has not generally prevailed. The first response of many people to a new proposition is negative; hence the voting method which is the quickest may itself produce a negative response. Minorities tend to be more radical than majorities. If decision is postponed in the effort to secure unity, time is given

for an advanced minority to convince the majority. In the end a more novel decision may result.

The question was raised whether the directory will be passed on to NPYM as in the past. No decision was made to do so; it will be taken up in the next M4B in October.

Worship and Ministry Report (W&M)

1. WMC proposes changes to zoom/hybrid Meetings for Worship: Cease hybrid meetings due to lack of interest.

WMC is *not* proposing to stop hybrid for Meeting for Business.

Other comments:

- John Burt is often the only attender of hybrid or virtual, although others mentioned their inability to join in hybrid online occasionally. This is usually due to problems getting the system hooked up.
- Others commented their interest in joining hybrid as needed (e.g. when illness keeps them home, traveling).
- Some commenters were interested in keeping this service available and see it as outreach. Others felt that there are other good online options available, so that we don't have to keep the CFM available (e.g. Pendle Hill).
- One problem may be that there is not currently an active rides coordinator to help people get to M4W.

- Some people find the TV screen distracting. There are some who will not attend when there is a hybrid M4W.
- The setup sometimes requires a lot of fussing which is also distracting, and stressful to people in the Meeting Room, those online, as well as the person setting up.
- It became hard to find people willing to set up the zoom because of connectivity problems.
- The hybrid approach isn't consistent with simplicity.

Alternate suggestions:

- * Instead of the TV screen, use a computer screen which is less obtrusive to the Meeting Room, and easier to set up. It should be possible for the Meeting hosts to manage it in addition to their other duties. This **option was approved** by the Meeting. WMC will evaluate the success of this in a few months.
2. WMC will continue with the Spiritual Connections program. It will be in person, this year, beginning with the last Sunday of September, 2nd Hour. A decision will be made at that time, by attenders, when future programs will meet. The topic will be What unwritten/unspoken traditions do Quakers have?
 3. The final potluck/outdoor M4W will take place next week, September 21 at Bob and Wendy's home. We will be celebrating Laura Horsey's membership of CFM. Future potlucks will continue the 3rd week of the month at the Meeting House.
 4. Nina Joy Lawrence sent out an email regarding a book group intending to work through Resmaa Menakem's new book: "The Quaking of America; An Embodied Guide to Navigating Our Nations Upheaval and Racial Reckoning." This will be a year long study of racism and body practice. If you are interested, contact Nina Joy. A similar group met four years ago to work through Menakem's book "My Grandmother's Hands."

Pastoral Care Committee (PCC)

1. Potluck on the 3rd Sunday, will also celebrate the recent membership of Laura Horsey to CFM.
2. PCC has reached closure on two Friends who have had surgeries in recent months. It has been an intense, exhausting summer for this committee
3. PCC is dealing with various health concerns of several Friends.
4. Wendy thanked Friends who supported Martina while Wendy and Bob were out of town.
5. Clerk requests that potential visitors to James C., wait for a couple of weeks until he can get situated in his new home. Willamette Springs will be given a list of Friends who are recognized to visit. Let Bob Ward know if you want to be on that list. Friends are also encouraged to accompany James to events outside the residence.

PCC is also looking for someone to house James three wheeled bike temporarily. He also has boxes which need a temporary home (1-6 boxes).

Outreach

Friends will be reaching out to students and staff at the OSU Beaver Community Fair, the afternoon of September 26 on the OSU quad. Agencies, businesses, clubs, charities and churches will be available to share about their activities with students.

Friends are soliciting a variety of snacks from restaurants in town (Thai, Indian, etc.) as an expression of welcome to people with diverse identities. We will also have oatmeal cookies to hand out. There are currently enough cookie bakers.

Action Point *

- Help is requested for editing a pamphlet that will be handed out and for folding the brochures.
- Extra hands are needed to talk to students coming by the table. Volunteers are needed for noon, 1, and 2 o'clock.
- Friends are also needed to pick up food from the local restaurants.

One Friend asked what our next steps are, to encourage and attract interest in the Meeting. Another Friend suggested several students stayed for potluck and engaged with Friends after the outreach last year.

Peace, Justice, and Environment (PJE)

Food Bank - There are no specific donations requested this month for the South Corvallis Food Bank (SCFB). The usual requests are for TP, diapers, soap/shampoo/dish soap, side dishes for dinner (rice, mashed potatoes, pasta, vegetables, etc.).

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Advices & Queries - Sexuality

We do well to look past the outward appearances of orientation and identity to see the quality of all individuals and relationships in our meetings. Just as there is that of God in every person, there is that of God in every relationship that calls upon God. We remain tender toward all relationships founded on integrity, mutual respect, commitment, and love.

When dealing with issues of sexuality and sexual behavior, we strive for an appropriate balance between open, honest discussion and protection of privacy and confidentiality for individual members and attenders.

We take care to avoid sexual behavior based on license, exploitation, oppression, and violence in our personal lives and to witness against such behavior in our meetings and communities.

Parents support their children's healthy sexuality by providing good examples, constructively supporting each child's natural interest, and answering questions lovingly.

Friends are encouraged to maintain accurate resources on issues of sexuality, sexual behavior, and gender identity and to answer questions, especially from children, honestly and appropriately.

While the meeting can and should be a source of abiding love and support to members and attenders, we acknowledge that some situations may require professional intervention and others may require notification of law-enforcement authorities.

- Do we accept and appreciate our sexuality as part of our humanity and as a gift from God? How do we integrate our sexuality and our spirituality?
- How can we help each other be faithful in expressing our sexuality? Do we support members and attenders with love and care relating to their sexuality and gender identity?
- How safe is our meeting? How do we create an environment appropriate for discussion of deeply personal issues?
- How willing are we to talk openly and listen carefully when others' ideas and behavior are different from our own? How do we respond to that of God in them while acknowledging our own discomfort or disagreement?
- As individuals and as a meeting community, do we avoid stereotyping and judging people based on their relationships, sexual orientation, or gender identity?
- How do we love and respond to those who have been harmed by sexual discrimination, abuse, or violence? How do we love and respond to those who have committed the discrimination, abuse, or violence?
- Do we know how and when to refer members and attenders for professional help? Do we know how and when to contact legal authorities?
