Corvallis Friends Library: Quaker Quicks and Staff Picks

Short Journey Home: Awakening to Freedom with Thich Nhat Hanh. By Richard Brady. Reviewed by Carmen Brummet

Richard Brady, math teacher, Jewish, Buddhist, Quaker, shares in a very personal way how over many decades his meetings with Thich Nhat Hanh in Plum Village shaped his life. Brady describes interacting with his therapist as well as interacting with Thich Nhat Hanh, who discouraged note-taking because he believed in transmitting heart to heart. The renowned Buddhist teacher liked to draw pictures to express concepts (much like our own Nina Joy!). I resonated with Brady's comment that little by little he was letting go of the intergenerational

pattern of self-sufficiency. And the message “Thanks to impermanence, everything is possible,” seems especially worthy of contemplation today.

Meeting may choose one of the following three topics for this visit: AFSC's Palestine activism; Quakers and Palestine; or Solidarity with Palestine: what we are called to do in 2026.

Assessments for WQM is one of the few times membership makes a difference and even then, long time attenders and contributors can be included in the assessment even if they are not members. If Nominating Committee needed to know whether a prospective nomination for Clerk of the
